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SAD Chief Sukhbir Badal attacked in Nanded, Fadnavis orders probe

Shiromani Akali Dal chief and former Punjab Deputy Chief Minister Sukhbir Singh Badal was "attacked by a Nihang" inside a gurdwara premises in Maharashtra's Nanded on Thursday, the district police said and added that he was taken to a hospital after injuries to his hand. Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis has ordered an inquiry into the attack on Sukhbir Singh Badal. The Chief Minister spoke with Sukhbir Singh Badal on the phone. Badal is learnt to have told Fadnavis that he is



stable.

Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis sought information about the incident from the Nanded Superintendent of Police, CMO sources

said. They said the accused was arrested immediately, and the Chief Minister has ordered an investigation into the motive behind the attack. Badal's condition is reported to be stable, the sources said. Badal also faced an attack in December 2024, when he was targeted in an attempted shooting at the Golden Temple in Amritsar while he was performing 'seva'. The attacker allegedly attempted to fire at Badal but was overpowered before he could cause harm. The 2024 attack took place while Badal was carrying out 'seva' after the Akal Takht declared him a 'tankhaiya', or guilty of religious misconduct.

Attacker lived at Gurdwara for 2 yrs

CHANDIGARH: Shiromani Akali Dal leader and former Punjab deputy chief minister Sukhbir Singh Badal was attacked with a sharp-edged weapon at a gurdwara in Maharashtra's Nanded on Thursday, in an incident that has raised fresh questions about security arrangements around the prominent Sikh politician. Police detained the alleged attacker at the scene. According to police, the attacker has been identified as 62-year-old Jaspal Singh, who was reportedly living at the same gurdwara complex for about two years.

Both Houses adjourned sine die amid fierce BJP-INDIA bloc standoff

Both the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha were adjourned sine die on Thursday, making a Parliament washout as aggressive sloganeering and fierce counter-protests from both the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Opposition INDIA bloc derailed parliamentary proceedings. Earlier, the BJP protested against Leader of the Opposition Rahul Gandhi over the Congress party's lack of acknowledgement regarding the



ongoing protests in Jharkhand. That was followed by controversial sloganeering by opposition MPs, led by Congress MP Pawan Khera, who were seen protesting with a toy monkey and sloganeering, "56 inch ka chhota bandar, jaldi aao sadan ke andar."

CPI(M) MP Amra Ram ac-

cused the BJP government of indulging in theatrics and passing legislation without debate; a trend he claimed was unprecedented in Parliament's history. "The ruling BJP bears the primary responsibility for this, as it refuses to address issues concerning the public. Look at the inhumane repression inflicted upon children, the use of pellet guns and stun guns, and the refusal to even provide an answer. They are merely interested in theatrics. In my 70 years of life, I have never witnessed bills being passed in Parliament without discussion."

PM Modi calls wife Harsimrat Kaur, seeks update

NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday spoke to Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) chief Sukhbir Singh Badal's wife, Harsimrat Kaur Badal, over the phone and inquired about his health following the attack on him at a gurdwara in Maharashtra's Nanded. According to sources, PM Modi spoke to Harsimrat Kaur Badal and enquired about Sukhbir Badal's health after the SAD chief was attacked by a Nihang inside the gurdwara premises in Nanded. Following the incident, Badal was taken to a hospital with an injury to his hand, Nanded Police said.

CJP launches nationwide 'School Thik Karo' movement to overhaul rural govt schools

As part of the initiative, CJP has introduced the "Sarpanch Challenge", encouraging parents, students and young people to inspect local government schools and work with village Sarpanches and Panchayats to identify and address infrastructure gaps.

Cabinet meeting chaired by Haryana Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini was held on Thursday, during which 12 agenda items were discussed and unanimously approved. Following the meeting, Chief Minister Saini held a press conference and announced that the cabinet had finalized the dates for the monsoon session. The Haryana monsoon session will commence on August 27 and continue for three days.

The Cabinet also approved the proposal for framing the Haryana Private Coaching Institutes (Registration and Regulation) Rules, 2026, aimed at providing a structured regulatory framework for the registration and function-

ing of private coaching institutes in the state.

The rules are being framed under the Haryana Registration and Regulation of Private Coaching Institutes Act, 2024, which provides for registration and regulation of private coaching institutes offering coaching for higher studies, jobs, professional courses and competitive examinations. The Act was in consonance with the January 2024 guidelines issued by GOI.

Under the approved framework, every existing private coaching institute as well as any institute intending to establish a new coaching centre will be required to apply for registration through the designated portal. A registration fee of 10,000 has been prescribed, payable electronically.

SSF to make Punjab India’s road safety hub with AI, drones and satellite technology

Not only is the Punjab Police ensuring the safety of residents from criminals, but it is also setting new standards with its flagship project of Sadak Surakhya Force (SSF), a dedicated highway patrol for saving the lives of commuters and making Punjab Police the first 3D Police Force in India by integrating drones, satellite imagery, and AI-powered predictive systems.

The impact of the dedicated highway patrol is already visible on the roads it mans. From February 2024 to January 2026, the SSF attended 43,983 road accidents, helping a total of 47,386 people. During these interventions, 19,973 persons were provided first aid at the spot, while 27,413 injured persons were shifted to hospitals, contributing towards saving lives through prompt emergency response and medical assistance. The Punjab SSF, introduced as a dedicated force for highway safety, focuses exclusively on patrolling designated stretches of highways



and major roads. Unlike conventional policing, SSF personnel are not diverted for routine law-and-order duties, with their primary focus being road safety, rapid response and assistance to accident victims.

The force is equipped with 144 high-tech vehicles and more than 1,600 specially trained personnel, including nearly 28 percent women recruits. The teams are strategically deployed every 30 km along 4,100 km of critical national and state highways and major district roads. SSF teams respond to accidents

including crash investigation and emergency medical response. For the last two years, reports consistently show a massive 45-48 percent drop in road accident fatalities on the specific highway stretches they patrol.

On such SSF-manned roads, fatalities reportedly dropped from 1,955 in 2023 to 1,016 in 2024. That's approximately 940 lives saved on those specific corridors in about a year." The SSF was officially launched by Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on January 27, 2024, in Jalandhar.

Paddy straw to power: Vedanta power turns biomass into opportunity for sustainable energy and stubble management

On the occasion of World Bio-fuel Day, Vedanta Power Limited's Talwandi Sabo Thermal Plant is highlighting its efforts to promote the productive utilisation of agricultural residue through biomass co-firing at its 1,980 MW thermal power plant located in Mansa, Punjab. Paddy straw has traditionally been a significant residue-management challenge for the region during the harvesting season. The biomass initiative of Talwandi Sabo Thermal Plant demonstrates how agricultural residue can be transformed into a useful energy resource while creating an organised pathway for its collection and utilisation. During FY 2025-26, the plant co-fired approximately 3.61 Lakh Metric Tonnes (LMT) of biomass, ac-



counting for around 5.21% of its total fuel consumption. This has created a substantial industrial demand for biomass and provided an alternative utilisation pathway for paddy straw that may otherwise be disposed of through open field burning. The initiative also supports the development of a structured biomass supply chain involving the collection, baling, transportation and processing of paddy straw.

In a significant push to bolster mental healthcare governance and ensure the protection of the rights of persons with mental illness, Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann-led Punjab Government is in the process of empowering the State Mental Health Authority (SMHA).

The State Mental Health Authority serves as the state's apex statutory body that oversees and regulates the implementation of the Mental Healthcare Act, 2017. It is responsible for registering and

supervising mental health establishments, setting quality and service standards, registering specified mental health professionals, and advising the government on matters relating to mental health policy. At the same time, it will also ensure that the rights guaranteed under the Act are implemented. The framework also includes Mental Health Review Boards (MHRBs) for districts. Each Board is chaired

by a District Judge or eligible judicial officer and provides an independent mechanism for reviewing admissions and treatment decisions, hearing complaints and rights violations, reviewing advance directives and nominated representatives, and inspecting mental health establishments where required. The Authority brings under one roof administrators and experts from various departments.

As envisaged under the Act, it is chaired by the Principal Secretary of the Health Department.

Apart from the Chairperson, other senior officials from health, medical education, and social welfare departments are also included. Currently, the state has nominated names for non-official members for the authority to ensure both administrative and community representation.

Five held with 7 pistols, 2kg heroin in Amritsar

In a major breakthrough amidst the ongoing drive to make Punjab a safe and secure state as per directions of Chief Minister Bhagwant Singh Mann, Amritsar Commissionerate Police has dismantled two major cross-border drug and illegal arms supply networks with the arrest of five individuals and recovered seven illegal pistols and 2.030 kg heroin from their possession, said Director General of Police (DGP) Punjab Gaurav Yadav here on Thursday.

Those arrested have been identified as Pargat Singh alias Pagga (30) and Janbar Singh (20), both residents of village Dall in Tarn Taran; Balwinder Singh alias Billa (30), a resident of village Doake in Amritsar Rural; Amandeep Singh alias Aman (37), a resident of Sarwarpora in Amritsar; and Balwinder Singh alias Kala (42), a resident of Kot Atma Ram in Amritsar. The recovered pistols include four .30 bore (Made in China) and three 9MM (Made in Austria). Apart from this, police teams have also impounded their



two motorcycles being used for criminal activities. DGP Gaurav Yadav said that preliminary investigation has revealed that the accused in the Arms Act case were allegedly in contact with foreign-based smugglers and procuring illegal weapons for further supply in Amritsar and Tarn Taran area.

The DGP said that further investigation is underway to establish the complete forward and backward linkages and to verify the alleged links with foreign-based smugglers and uncover the wider supply network.

Sharing operational details, Commissioner of Police (CP) Amritsar Harmanbir Singh Gill said that in the first case, acting on reliable

intelligence, police arrested accused Pargat alias Pagga, Janbar Singh and Balwinder alias Billa and recovered five illegal pistols from their possession.

Based on the disclosures made by accused Pargat alias Pagga and Balwinder alias Billa, police recovered two pistols from the location pinpointed by them, he said. In another operation, the CP said that acting on specific intelligence, police intercepted accused Amandeep alias Aman and Balwinder alias Kala. During the search, 2.03 kg heroin was recovered from their possession.

He said that more arrests and recoveries are likely in coming days as the investigation progresses.

79-Year wait ends as 9-crore road project begins in Fatehpur

NURPUR: The nearly eight-decade wait of residents of seven villages in Himachal Pradesh's Fatehpur Assembly constituency for a pucca road is set to end with the commencement of a Rs 908.96-lakh road project. State Planning Board Vice Chairman and Fatehpur MLA Bhawani Singh Pathania performed the foundation ceremony for the 6.690-km road connecting Badiyali, Khudiyal, Dheru, Sunet, Bareil, Lower Takwal and Dhiman Mohalla. The road, being constructed under the Rural Infrastructure Development Fund (RIDF) through the Public Works Department's Fatehpur division, is scheduled to be completed by November 8, 2027. According to PWD officials, the project will include formation cutting, retaining and breast walls, crash barriers, cross-drainage works, U-shaped drains and parapets. Granular sub-base and grading work will be undertaken along about 4.080 km, while metalling and tarring will cover around 5.600 km and concrete pavement will be provided on 1.090 km.

Stop misleading public over Bhoranj Hospital, BJP leader tells MLA

Former Bhoranj MLA and senior BJP leader Kamlesh Kumari on Thursday accused incumbent Congress MLA Suresh Kumar of misleading the public over the development of Bhoranj hospital and urged him to focus on improving healthcare facilities in the constituency.

Citing government records, Kumari said major infrastructure work at the hospital, including an emergency ward and a hospital building, had been completed during the previous BJP government, while construction of another building had also been initiated. She challenged Kumar to stop what she termed "petty politics" over the hospital and, if he was genuinely committed to public welfare, seek sanction



for a new 100-bed hospital at Bharedi, Jahu or Awahdevi.

Kumari said a 50-bed state-of-the-art emergency ward was established at Bhoranj hospital during the Covid-19 pandemic with central assistance. The facility included a Central Medical Gas Pipeline System and an oxygen manifold room to provide oxygen directly to beds. Referring to official documents, she said the BJP government had issued a notification on February 20, 2018, creating hundreds of

posts across 28 departments. She claimed posts for 20 clinical and specialist services were also sanctioned for the proposed 100-bed hospital. According to Kumari, the services included medicine, surgery, gynaecology, paediatrics, orthopaedics, anaesthesia, ENT, ophthalmology, dermatology and radiodiagnosis, besides a blood bank.

She said former Chief Minister Jai Ram Thakur had announced the 100-bed hospital in December 2018 and allocated Rs 24 crore for the project. An advanced ultrasound machine was also installed at the hospital during the 2017-22 BJP tenure, she claimed. Kumari alleged that despite the availability of hospital infrastructure, the present Congress government had failed to provide adequate equipment, furniture and staff.

Sukhu govt picking pockets under guise of cess: Sanjay Sharma

BJP state spokesperson Sanjay Sharma noted that before coming to power, the Congress had promised 300 units of free electricity and a monthly allowance of Rs. 1,500 for women. Kangana Ranaut accuses Rahul Gandhi of avoiding debate

BJP MP Kangana Ranaut on Thursday criticised the Opposition over its continued protest in Parliament, accusing Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi of demanding answers from the government while simultaneously refusing to allow a discussion to take place. Ranaut said the Opposition's conduct was "highly objectionable" and alleged that the repeated protests had disrupted the atmosphere in Parliament. "It is highly objectionable. They have completely disrupted the atmosphere here. The situation is deteriorating day by day," Ranaut said. Her remarks came amid the continuing standoff between the government and the Opposition over the student protests and the demand for a statement from Union Home Minister Amit



Shah. The Opposition has been demanding answers from the government over the police action against students protesting in Delhi, while the government has maintained that the matter can be discussed in Parliament. On Wednesday, Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju said Amit

Shah was ready to participate in a discussion on the student protests and respond to the issues raised by the Opposition. Ranaut questioned the Opposition's approach, saying Rahul Gandhi was asking questions of the Home Ministry while at the same time stating that the Opposition would not allow

the Home Minister to speak. "On the one hand, Rahul Gandhi asks questions of the Home Ministry, yet he says they won't let the Home Ministry speak. What kind of behaviour is this?" she said. The BJP MP alleged that the Opposition was demanding a discussion but was unwilling to hear the government's response once an opportunity for debate was offered. "They demand a discussion, but when offered one, he claims he doesn't want an answer," Ranaut said. Her comments come amid repeated disruptions in Parliament during the ongoing Monsoon Session. The Opposition has maintained that it wants the government to answer specific questions regarding the treatment of protesting students, while the government has accused the Opposition of preventing the House from functioning.

RBI proposes harmonised interest rate rules

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has issued draft directions to harmonise interest-rate regulations across all regulated entities, aiming to improve monetary policy transmission, ensure appropriate pricing of credit risk and promote fair treatment of borrowers.Titled “Reserve Bank of India (Interest Rates on Loans and Advances) Directions, 2026,” the draft guidelines were released on Wednesday, following the central bank’s Developmental and Regulatory Policies statement of August 5, 2026.The proposed framework provides common, principles-based rules for interest rates on both fixed- and floating-rate loans. From April 1, 2027, floating-rate loans would be required to reset within a maximum period of three months.The RBI has also proposed changes to the calculation of the Marginal Cost of Funds Based Lending Rate (MCLR). Banks would use a three-month moving average of the weighted cost of fresh deposits and fresh borrowings for determining the MCLR.The central bank noted that existing regulations on interest rates for advances are primarily applicable to commercial banks, including Small Finance Banks and Local Area Banks. Other regulated entities, including NBFCs, All India Financial Institutions, Regional Rural Banks and cooperative banks, currently have comparatively limited interest-rate regulations.The RBI also observed differences in the way commercial banks determine internal benchmarks such as MCLR and noted that regulatory provisions for fixed-rate loans remain limited.Under the proposed framework, non-credit-risk components of the spread on floating-rate loans would not be allowed to be revised during the first three years. The Credit Risk Premium, however, could be revised if there is a change in the borrower’s credit profile.Existing floating-rate loans would have to migrate to the revised framework by April 1, 2029. Such migration would require borrower consent and would not involve additional charges or an increase in the interest rate.The RBI has invited comments and suggestions from stakeholders and members of the public through its ‘Connect 2 Regulate’ portal or by email until September 11, 2026. The final directions will be issued separately for different categories of regulated entities after consideration of the feedback received.

West Asia War: The world is paying the price for a conflict it cannot control

The world has discussed the West Asia war from every possible angle—military strategy, geopolitics, energy security, supply chains, economic resilience, and humanitarian consequences. There are articles, television debates, conferences, and strategic assessments everywhere. Yet, despite knowing the consequences and knowing that the war must stop, the world appears helpless.

The real cost of this war cannot be measured only by calculating the military expenditure or the economic losses of Israel, Iran or America. Its impact has reached almost every part of the world. With around 8.5 billion people on the planet, even an additional burden of USD 10–50 per person represents an enormous economic loss. The cumulative global impact has already crossed the trillion-dollar level when measured through increased costs, disrupted supply chains, energy prices, transportation, trade and lost economic opportunities.

The worst sufferers are not the wealthy. A high-income household may absorb higher fuel, food and transportation costs. But for the poor, lower-middle and middle-income population—perhaps nearly 80 per cent of the world’s people—such additional costs are not affordable. Their economic growth is being pushed backwards and their cost of living is rising.

This is no longer simply a war in West Asia. It has become a war whose economic consequences are being paid for by the entire world.

The most disturbing question is not whether the world understands the consequences. It does.

Almost every country knows that this war has to stop. Almost every country knows the repercussions. Yet the collective opinion of the affected world has not been able to influence the course of the war.

America and Israel have, in effect, dragged the wider world into a situation where countries that have no effective say in the decision-making are compelled to bear the consequences. The global economy has been hijacked by decisions whose repercussions are being distributed



across the world.

The world is watching from drawing rooms, television studios, universities and think tanks. More books will be written and more strategic analyses will emerge. But analysis without collective action has a limit.

Initially, countries waited for the war to end quickly. They used their reserves and absorbed the shock. Then came another phase: countries and selected interests began discovering strategic and economic opportunities in the continuation of the conflict. Direct and indirect involvement increased, and strategic interests started competing with the larger interest of humanity.

Iran, meanwhile, has been pushed into a position where the losses to its population, economy and geography have become so high that bearing the pain for a longer period has itself become the strategy.

This war has exposed a new dimension of modern warfare.

The decisive factor is no longer simply who has the better military equipment, superior communications, greater financial

resources or more sophisticated strategic planning. The real question is: who has the resilience to bear the pain for longer?

The attacker may have greater military strength, but the ultimate outcome may depend on the capacity of the people and the system being attacked to survive.

History has repeatedly shown this. Vietnam, Afghanistan, Iraq, North Korea and now Iran demonstrate that military power cannot simply eliminate a people, their geography, culture or civilisation.

You cannot eliminate geography. You cannot eliminate the will of people. You cannot eliminate a civilisation through bombs, military action, nuclear threats or any other form of force.

Ultimately, it is the capacity to bear pain that determines how long a conflict can continue.

This creates a paradox for advanced and comfortable societies. The higher the standard of living and the greater the dependence on uninterrupted consumption, the lower may be the tolerance for prolonged disruption. The societies that can absorb pain for longer may therefore

possess an unexpected strategic advantage.

Pakistan offers another important lesson. A country already facing serious economic difficulties cannot indefinitely attempt to benefit by positioning itself between those inflicting the pain and those bearing it. Pakistan appears to have found another opportunity to become a deal-maker and extract economic or strategic advantage.

But a country cannot permanently stand on both sides.

The direct and indirect role of Pakistan’s military leadership also exposes another danger: when military authority becomes more powerful than democratic institutions, an elected Prime Minister or President can become subordinate to an unelected power structure.

Such a model is dangerous. If military leadership can bypass democratic institutions to serve the interests of a few leaders or external masters, the entire democratic system becomes vulnerable.

India’s role now requires a fundamental reconsideration.

India is one of the most affected countries by developments in West Asia. Its energy security, trade, shipping, diaspora, supply chains and economic growth are directly connected with the region.

Therefore, India’s strategic silence cannot continue indefinitely.

India should not necessarily align itself with America, Russia or China. It should instead build a collective platform of countries whose people are actually paying the price of this conflict.

A vast part of West Asia, Africa, Asia and South Asia is affected. Around 1.4 billion Indians and billions of people across Africa and South Asia cannot remain spectators while decisions taken by a few powers affect their livelihoods.

If India does not make its voice heard, this entire region will struggle to articulate its concerns.

India’s role should therefore move from strategic silence to strategic leadership—not leadership against any particular country, but leadership for those whose economic and human interests are being affected.

The most important strategic lesson of this war may be the vulnerability of global shipping and trading routes.

The world has now discovered that one does not need a nuclear bomb to create enormous economic destruction. Stopping shipping routes, energy corridors and trade routes can economically damage entire countries and potentially the world.

This is a new form of low-tech economic warfare, and in some circumstances it may be more dangerous than conventional military action.

It also creates a new economic temptation for countries located near critical trade routes. If advanced countries have historically benefited from controlling technology, financial institutions and global economic systems, developing countries may increasingly argue that they too have a right to derive legitimate economic benefit from their geography.

Food prices may push inflation higher

India’s retail inflation is expected to rise from current levels in the coming months, driven mainly by food prices but it will likely remain below the Reserve Bank of India’s (RBI) 6 per cent upper tolerance limit, as per analysts.

India’s retail inflation rose to 4.45 per cent in July from 4.38 per cent in June, on the back of higher

while inflation is likely to edge up from current levels over the coming months, primarily on account of food prices, it should remain below the RBI’s upper tolerance band of 6%.”Against this backdrop, we expect the RBI to stay on an extended policy pause,” Chhabra said.

As per Debopam Chaudhuri, Chief Economist, Piramal Group, the

inflation could undershoot the RBI’s projected peak of 5.9% for the December 2026 quarter.

Such an outcome would support a more favourable interest rate environment, helping sustain consumer demand while also improving the viability of leveraged private sector capex,” she said.According to Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist, ICRA Ltd, CPI inflation is expected to average 5% in FY2027, in line with the MPC’s forecast, with the prolonging of tensions in West Asia and monsoon outturn posing risks to the upside.”While immediate policy tightening is unlikely, elevated inflation projections for Q3 FY2027 through Q1 FY2028, suggest that the next move on rates is going to be a hike.

Evidence of a generalisation in inflationary pressures in the next few months could result in a rate hike in the December 2026 meeting,” she noted. On the other hand, Rajeev Sharan, Head of Research, Brickwork Ratings, noted, “For Q2 FY27 (July–September 2026), we expect headline inflation to average around 4.5–4.7%, with a mild uptick likely in September as base effects turn less favourable. Going forward, food will remain the key swing factor amid uneven monsoon and El Nino-related uncertainty.”

In a post on X, Chinese Ambassador to India Xu Feihong said, “Shared my views on the characteristic and development direction of BRICS cooperation with the five letters of MAGIC: Multilateralism, Action, Global Governance, Inclusiveness and Cooperation.”He further underlined that China stands ready to work in tandem with all partner countries to deepen the cooperation between BRICS members.

“China extends full support to India for its BRICS presidency, and we stand ready to work hand in hand with all member countries to strengthen constructive cooperation and lead a durable and fruitful greater BRICS cooperation!”

Russia’s Charge d’Affaires, Roman Babushkin also addressed the event. The Russian Embassy in



India noted in a post on Telegram that Roman Babushkin reaffirmed Russia’s support for India’s BRICS Chairship priorities in 2026, noting that over the past two decades the grouping has evolved into an effective mechanism for multifaceted practical cooperation and an influential platform for advancing the interests of the global majority amid the emergence of a multipolar world order.

The Vivekananda International Foundation hosted a discussion on “BRICS Role and Priorities in Building a Resilient and Sustainable Global Order” on Wednesday.

In a post on X it noted that the

discussions explored BRICS’ evolving role in a changing global order, with emphasis on resilience, sustainability, inclusivity, multilateralism and South-South cooperation.

At the event, speakers highlighted cooperation in climate, trade, finance, digital governance, food and energy security, technology and connectivity. The discussions also highlighted the importance of BRICS as a platform for practical, people-centric cooperation, guided by the spirit of “Humanity First”.Significantly, discussions on greater AI and civilisational dialogue, connectivity and sharing of capabilities among

BRICS countries were also emphasised.

India’s BRICS Chairship in 2026 is its fourth, having previously held the position in 2012, 2016 and 2021. The Chairship is guided by the theme “Building for Resilience, Innovation, Cooperation and Sustainability”, reflecting a people-centric and humanity-first approach articulated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at the 2025 Rio Summit.BRICS currently brings together eleven major emerging economies: Brazil, China, Egypt, Ethiopia, India, Indonesia, Iran, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and the United Arab Emirates.

The grouping serves as a

platform for consultation and cooperation on issues of global and regional significance, as well as on global political and economic governance.

The BRICS 2026 website highlights how the grouping’s agenda has expanded significantly from its original focus on economic issues to three core pillars -- political and security cooperation, economic and financial cooperation, and cultural and people-to-people exchanges.

It further notes that BRICS cooperation now covers a wide range of issues, including counter-terrorism, climate change, food and energy security, international

Centre outlines measures on university vacancies, private school fees

The government outlined measures to address faculty vacancies in higher education, regulate fees in private educational institutions and strengthen the availability of special educators in schools, with the details being provided in written replies in the Rajya Sabha by Ministers of State for Education Dr Sukanta Majumdar and Jayant Chaudhary.

On faculty vacancies, Dr Majumdar said recruitment in Central Higher Education Institutions (CHEIs), including Central Universities, is undertaken by the respective institutions in accordance with their Acts, statutes and regulations. Vacancies in State Universities are filled by the concerned state governments or universities and are not maintained centrally.

He said vacancies are a continuous phenomenon arising from retirement, promotion, resignation, death, creation of new institutions and expansion of student capacity.

To accelerate recruitment, centrally funded institutions have adopted year-round advertisements, special and mission-mode drives and search-cum-selection procedures.

The UGC’s CU-CHAYAN portal also provides a common platform for vacancies and recruitment in Central Universities. Since September 2022, CHEIs have undertaken mission-mode recruitment drives.

Up to May 23, 2026, a total of 32,114 posts, including 18,757 faculty positions, had been filled, the minister said. The government had earlier directed CHEIs in 2021, 2022 and again in October 2025 to fill backlog



vacancies, including those reserved for SC, ST and OBC categories. The government also

highlighted the Malaviya Mission Teacher Training Programme, launched in 2023 through 151 centres.

More than four lakh faculty members have so far been trained under the programme.

On education fees, Jayant Chaudhary said regulation of private school fees largely falls

under state governments and UT administrations, as education is a Concurrent List subject. The RTE Act, 2009, mandates at least 25 per cent entry-level seats in private unaided schools for children from weaker sections and disadvantaged groups and prohibits capitation fees. For CBSE-affiliated private schools, fee revisions require approval of the School Management Committee or compliance with the process prescribed by the appropriate government.

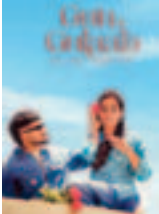
CBSE guidelines also prohibit schools from forcing students to purchase books, uniforms or stationery from specified vendors. The government further said that special educator recruitment falls within the domain of states and Uts.

Under Samagra Shiksha, special educators can be deployed at block or

cluster levels to serve multiple schools. The prescribed pupil-teacher ratio is one special educator for every 10 children with special needs at primary level and one for every 15 at upper-primary level. According to UDISE 2025-26 data, 1.17 lakh schools have a dedicated special educator, against 22.11 lakh enrolled children with special needs.The government is also supporting teacher training through NISHTHA, inclusive education modules and the integration of dedicated inclusive education credits into the Four-Year Integrated Teacher Education Programme. The Rehabilitation Council of India has approved 1,081 institutions/universities to offer courses in disability rehabilitation and special education, contributing to the pool of trained special educators.
